Past winner of many fiddle championships, Alistair is the fiddle instructor at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland and has tutored many of the new generation of rising stars. Alistair has performed in over twenty countries,

including Australia, New Zealand, China, Nigeria, Kazakhstan, Venezuela, the Middle East and throughout Europe and North America. Alistair is an enthusiastic and inspirational teacher and has been invited to tutor at the Swannanoa Gathering Celtic Week in North Carolina, the Southern Hemisphere International School of Scottish Fiddling in New Zealand, Boston Harbor Fiddle School, the Akademia Muzyczna in Wroclaw, Poland and closer to home, Feis Rois in Ullapool. Beth Murray (piano; Massachusetts): Started Scottish Country dancing in 1980, and held many roles within the RSCDS Boston Branch: Executive Committee member, dancer, teacher and musician. She released an album with fiddler Ed Pearlman in 1987, *Boston Hospitality*, which established her as an innovative dynamic pianist. Beth has taught piano for decades, and plays

James Gray (piano, accordion; Oslo, Norway) was born into a family actively involved in the local Scottish Country Dance scene, and grew up surrounded by a love of Scottish music and culture. His first piano lessons were with his grandmother, who played for his parents' dance classes, and he later took up the accordion. He danced from birth (he had no choice!) and was director of the first RSCDS Spring Fling. James

has released CDs with Susie Petrov, Laura Risk, Andrew Lyon and his band Scottish Measure, with Gregor Borland, and Keith Smith. His solo album *Piano Dance* features the "hit singles" for the dances *Sands of Morar* and *Iona Cross*. The CD *Opus Dance* features his compositions and provides music for his father's book of dances *Tweeddale Collection Volume 4*. James aspires to provide music that is great for both the ears and the feet.



Peter Macfarlane (fiddle; Vermont) has been performing Scottish music for more than three decades. He discovered the music through Scottish dancing, and this informs and infuses his playing. He cut his musical teeth playing in many of the Scottish dance bands in southern England, learning from master musicians and performing in large parts of England and Wales as well as

During the first class period, we offer multiple different SCD dance classes. Please consult the formations list and your personal assessment of your dancing level and goals on the opposite page to help identify the class that would provide the most enjoyment for both you and your fellow dancers. Not every class will be offered every day — check the daily schedules for specifics!

Essential Skills (Beginner, Capable, Competent/All Welcome):

For dancers who want to learn or work on steps and figures included on our list of standard steps and formations of Scottish Country Dancing. Classes will also explore social aspects of dancing, such as teamwork, handing, and eye contact and may expand into skills such as smoothing transitional flow between formations, musical phrasing, deportment, and covering.

Engaging Figures (Proficient/Low Impact):

For dancers familiar with all steps and formations on our list of standard steps and formations of Scottish Country Dancing. The class will present interesting and spatially challenging dances, emphasizing essential group skills such as teamwork, phrasing, covering, handing, and eye contact.

Technical Challenges (Proficient/High Impact):

For dancers familiar with all steps and formations on our list of standard steps and formations of Scottish Country Dancing, who can execute travelling and setting steps at a high standard as well as perform smooth transitions between them. These will be physically demanding classes expecting fluency in formations and stamina and strong form in dancing.

SCD Conditioning (All Welcome):

These classes will focus on dancing from the inside out, exploring healthy movement habits and encouraging fully-embodied dancing. We will strengthen muscles crucial to Scottish Country Dancing technique, practice efficient alignment, and cultivate bodily and spatial awareness individually and in formations.

Dancing Levels and Goals

Beginner: I am a dancer with little to no prior experience of Scottish Country Dancing and look forward to joining in!

Capable: I want to learn or review common steps and figures such as Rights and Lefts, Turn Corners and Partner, Set To and Turn Corners, and Reels of Three and Four. I'd like to focus on social aspects of dancing, such as teamwork, handing, and eye contact.

Competent: I'd like to improve my performance of footwork and common figures and would also like to expand into slightly more demanding steps and figures, such as Highland Schottische setting, Double Triangles, Set and Link, Corners Pass and Turn, and Set and Rotate. I'd like to work on smoothing transitional flow between formations and on musical phrasing, deportment, and covering.

Proficient (High Impact Technique): I have all the common formations at my fingertips, and can execute travelling and setting steps at a high standard. I regularly make smooth transitions between changing steps and figures. I am looking for physically demanding classes expecting fluency in formations and strong form in dancing.

Proficient (Low Impact Social): I have a lot of experience with all the steps and formations in the standard repertoire of Scottish Country Dancing. I'd like to learn interesting and spatially challenging dances, and reinforce my group skills such as teamwork, phrasing, covering, handing, and eye contact.

Additionally, there are many other classes offered throughout the week. Some are offered only once, others occur regularly. Please check each day's schedule grid to know when the classes are occurring!

Morning Social: This class is for all dancers who wish to expand their repertoire of dances and formations in a social setting. Attendees are expected to dance all steps and formations in our list of standard steps and formations of Scottish Country Dancing, with little or no teaching.

Music Staff



Tom Pixton - Music Director (accordion, piano, Massachusetts) has been active as a Scottish dance musician for more than thirty years. He wandered into the Cambridge Class Monday night in the early 90s with his accordion and has been with them ever since. Tom has worked with many of today's most accomplished dance teachers and musicians as accordionist, pianist, band leader,

music arranger, and CD producer. He has provided bands, music, and music leadership for RSCDS branches in Boston, New Haven, Atlanta, Chicago, and New York. His double-CD Live from C Sharp was recorded live at the 2010 Scottish Pinewoods Sessions, and features an all-star cast. This is Tom's fifth tenure as Pinewoods Music Director. Ben Anderson ('cello; Connecticut) specializes in Scottish 'cello, recreating the sound of the 18th-century Scottish dance bands in which the 'cello was an equal to the fiddle. Ben plays with his sister Elizabeth in a Boston-based Scottish fiddle and cello duo that has developed an enthusiastic following in the U.S. and internationally. Blending Scottish tunes with lively rhythms and

innovative harmonies, the pair create a sound rooted in tradition, inspired by the contemporary, and completely original. On stage, they captivate audiences with their ability to effortlessly communicate musical nuances as only siblings can.



Elizabeth Anderson (fiddle; Massachusetts) is the 2020 US National Scottish Fiddle Champion and the 2016 Perth All-Scotland Fiddle Champion. She is a familiar face in the Boston Scottish dance community both as a performer for parties and classes, as well as a dancer. Her recent dance performances have taken her to Pawling Weekend and Delaware Valley Hogmanay. As a



Mats Melin Swedish born traditional dancer, choreographer, and researcher Mats Melin has worked professionally with dance in Scotland since 1995 and in Ireland since 2005. He has been engaged in freelance work nationally and internationally as well as having been Traditional Dancer in Residence for four Scottish Local Authorities. He is a former

member of the Scottish Arts Council's Dance Committee and Scottish Government Working Group on Traditional Arts, and Traditional Dance Forum of Scotland. Mats is an Emeritus Lecturer in Dance and former MA Course Director in Irish Dance Studies and Ethnochoreology at the Irish World Academy, University of Limerick, Ireland. He has authored several books, including *One with the Music: Cape Breton step dancing tradition and transmission* (2015) and with Jen Schoonover *Dance Legacies of Scotland: The True Glen Orchy Kick* (2021).



Jen Schoonover is a dancer and choreographer. She teaches movement principles, improvisation, dance pedagogy, and dance modalities including Cape Breton Step, Ceilidh, Highland, and Scottish Country dancing. Jen's interest in the history of Scottish dance has led her to seek out dances from non-competitive and non-standardized traditions. A book she cowrote with

Mats Melin, *Dance Legacies of Scotland: The True Glen Orchy Kick*, detailing the history of Scottish percussive dancing, was recently published by Routledge. Another publication resulting from collaborative research of Frederick Hill's 1841 dance manuscript with Mats and our mutual friend, the late Colin Robertson, is in the works.

Teacher's Choice: Each class is a chance for our staff teachers to focus on a theme of choice.

Tonight's Easy Dances: This class is taught by the evening MC and is for everyone who wants to practice the easier dances on the evening program (those marked with an [E] on the program). The class is aimed to increase newer dancers' enjoyment of each evening's easier dances, and is especially recommended to those who consider themselves Beginner, Capable, or Competent dancers.

Tonight's Tricky Dances: This class is taught by the evening MC and is for everyone who wants to practice the trickier dances on the evening program (those marked with a [T] on the program). The class is recommended for dancers who consider themselves Competent or Proficient dancers and who are unfamiliar with the evening's tricky dances.

Pinewoods Reel Demystified: This is a class specifically focused on the fun but relatively complicated Scottish Country Dance The Pinewoods Reel. It was written for and debuted at Pinewoods Scottish Sessions by John Bowie Dickson in 1969 and is danced during each session's Highland Ball. If you have not done the dance before but would like to, we encourage you to attend.

Highland Dancing: Highland Dancing is an energetic, athletic, solo performance style of dance. Attendees of all experience levels are welcome and encouraged to attend, and should be prepared for a high-energy class with much hopping and springing. This year, Jen will be teaching the Dusty Miller, Shantruish, and the Marquis of Huntly's Highland Fling.

Step Dancing: The term "Step dancing" is used in Scotland to refer to any dance performed as a string of steps. This class may share Step dances from soft-shoe and percussive legacies. This year, Mats will be teaching steps from Aberdonian Lassie, Flowers of Edinburgh, the First of August, and John McNeil's Highland Fling.

Technique and Critique: This class highlights working towards ideal anatomical placement and alignment in dancing positions. The teacher may offer individualized and/or group feedback about dancing form

Potpourri Classes: These are camper-led classes exploring other elements of social dancing enjoyed by our community. Thank you to those wonderful teachers and musicians for offering their time and knowledge!

Yoga:

Led by Roberta Lasnik, this is a restorative class meant to keep bodies and minds flexible and refreshed for dancing. Please bring a yoga mat and belt if you have them, or a blanket and bathrobe tie if not.

Music Class:

For all instruments and levels. This class focuses on playing music for Scottish Country Dancing, and will cover such topics as strathspeys, jigs, and reels, arranging music sets suitable for dancing, and playing in a band.

Teaching Staff



Bruce Herbold began Scottish Country Dancing in 1976 in Berkeley and has pursued it avidly ever since. I began teaching in 1981 in Sacramento. In both dancing and teaching, I emphasize the social aspects of Scottish Country Dance, especially the joys of teamwork and social interaction. I teach regular Monday and Thursday night classes in Berkeley and San Francisco. I co-taught a teacher training class and

have taught at workshops in Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Cleveland, and California. The music, sociability, ingenuity, and fun of Scottish social dance continually inspire me.




Charles Liu was introduced to Scottish Country Dancing by his then girlfriend (now his wife). He was hooked after dancing for the entire evening of the Boston Highland Ball having only started Scottish dancing a couple of months earlier. Charles enjoyed Scottish dancing and music in the Boston area so much that he decided to train as a

teacher. After receiving his teaching certification, he served as the chair of the Teaching and Music Committee of the RSCDS Boston Branch, organizing many workshops to promote dancing, share teaching ideas and cultivate new dance teachers. He now teaches regularly in the Cambridge, Salem and Albany classes of the Boston Branch, coordinates the teaching staff at the Cambridge Class, and has been invited to lead workshops in New Hampshire, Maine and Virginia. What makes Charles love Scottish Country Dancing is not just the precise footwork and geography of the dances, but the unique energy from dancing to good Scottish tunes and interacting with others on the dance floor. He encourages dancers to pay attention to the music, support fellow dancers, and work together as a team, which is often more rewarding than focusing only on the steps and figures of the dance. Besides Scottish dancing, Charles dabbles in playing Scottish tunes on the fiddle and enjoys English Country Dancing. He supports his dancing and music hobbies by working as a securities examiner in the Boston area during the day.




