Newton Class

The seeds of the idea for daytime classes were sown one Sunday evening (2008 or 2009) at a regular Brookline class when a couple visiting from Britain attended and showed us Tambourine (it's a fun dance – look it up). They were an older couple who said they had learnt it at their local senior center. Fast forward to 2011: I talked to the coordinator of the "Over 55" programs run by Newton rec dept, and the Newton class was born. We met on Wednesday mornings from 10.30-12, with mostly me teaching but also Flo Hearn and Naomi Lev on occasion, and for a while the class was very active, even having a demo at the American Legion Post in Newton. Sadly, advancing old age for some, along with balance and memory difficulties meant depletion of numbers, and Covid finally ended the group. But as they say, it was fun while it lasted

While I was still teaching in Newton, I had moved to Bedford MA and was encouraged to start a class at the Senior center there also. This I did in 2016 and until Covid, continued to teach both. The Bedford class has several experienced dancers – some from the Newton class – and also happily some who have been introduced to SCD in their retirement, and are now sufficiently confident to dance elsewhere as well. In the early stages we welcomed a couple of home-schooled kids, and some high schoolers on school break, so it really was a class for anyone from 8-80+

The group is very enthusiastic and while not adhering strictly to the precepts of a former RSCDS chairman, of the three F's (fun, flight and formations), we do our best with the last two and definitely agree with the first. Covid shut us down for a while, but we reopened when the Senior center erected a canopy in the parking lot in July 2021 and have been dancing ever since (thankfully now indoors on a better floor). We meet every Tuesday from 12.30-2 pm in the Union room of the Senior Center (COA), 12 Mudge Way, Bedford. Please sign in as a guest.



Thank you for your resilience and flexibility as we (and many other dance and cultural groups) negotiated three difficult years of pandemic restrictions and (more important) illness among our friends and loved ones.

In many ways, the months since the new Exec was elected have been both challenging and uplifting. We had to deal with Omicron during Scottish Sessions at Pinewoods, but in the fall many Branch classes embraced in-person dancing, with masks required or optional. Dancing Through the Ages and Friends I Have Met!

It was little over a half century ago when one of the favorite activities of our family was to attend "junkets" at the home of Barbara & Bert Little in Newton, MA. Families came with instruments and set them down. In the large room, contras were danced throughout the night and all danced independent of age. Supper was put on a table that seemed enormous as a kid and housed many strange foods. After eating and more dancing it was time for the kids to disperse into other rooms or upstairs. It was truly a community event. So where does the Scottish dancing come in?

After a trip to Nova Scotia and the Gaelic school with my family, we asked Barbara Little if she would teach dancing and in typical fashion she said if we got a group she would teach and so on Thursday afternoons a carload of kids would come from my hometown in Wayland. In addition there were many members of the Little family – some even crossed a generation, and Duncan and Cindy Smith, the Kendalls, the Pattersons and that year the Morettis arrived from Scotland and there were others including a boy named Ian.

I think what made the dancing successful and long-lasting is that we encompassed a large range of ages and sexes from 4 through teens. Many a down and up was danced down the room, through the foyer into the next room – we were a lively group! Our teachers were Barbara Little, her daughter Liz (a student at Harvard I think) and Jean Kendall. Each had their own role. We even participated in Liz's wedding at the Harvard Chapel. At the same time there was a very large children's group in New Hampshire and we would go and dance and they would come down to the Littles. I remember as a girl having to wait to be asked, which was more formal than the Newton Class. My first introduction to Miss Milligan was also at the Littles' as some of us were selected to dance (with as I remember older folks) and I remember being rather terrified!

A number of us started dancing in the high school group in Lexington on Saturdays with a gentleman called Charlie Campbell. He was quite a bit more proper but our friendships from those days lasted for decades. Some of us went to the Boston Ball, which at that time was a real treat and competitive to attend with several hundred dancing at the Copley. During this time there were several other active groups and a number of us who grew up in the suburbs danced in the Weston group taught by Ed Rawson, and Alan and Lydia Smith. By that time we were coming from other activities but again a community was built. It was there I met Mark Ward, the Morrows' and the Rawsons' kids. I think most of us split during college but upon returning a number danced at the Cambridge Y and that is where I met Gregor.

Gregor and I became good friends and spent time skiing and bicycling along with dancing. At that time as Jeanetta would often tell you – the groups were more formal and one had to be reviewed to go to the advanced class. While I had not thought of teaching, at that time you didn't ask to become a teacher – you were tapped to take the course and so my teaching training started.

Gregor and I married in 1976 and we spent 6 weeks bicycling through England and Scotland, and along the way had tea with Nancy McClaren, and were surprised when Kathy Little jumped out of a car in Edinburgh in middle of traffic when she saw us on bikes! How funny. We ended at St Andrews and took what was then the preliminary certificate course. Gregor and I took the class with 2 other good friends from America, Anne Tufts and Duncan Smith. We were taught by Duncan MacLeod.

After the course Gregor and I left for graduate school at the U of Wisconsin-Madison where we started a group that is still going 40 years later. During that first year we received a heartbreaking call that Buck Little was killed in a house fire. To teach, Gregor and I used records and taught the group for 5-6 years and made some wonderful friends including Lois New, who was a graduate student. We met Lois at a New Year's dance in Concord, MA that first year when Laura, Doug and Ray Scott introduced us. Most of our class were students or faculty. During that time, we made "fieldtrips" to Minnesota where we introduced our class to larger groups of dancers and to Ron Wallace. We kept up with many throughout the years. Several persons became leaders after we left and some took the teaching course such as Lois and Chuck Snowdon. Gregor and I returned twice to Wisconsin to lead dancing, most recently staying

with Chuck where we participated in MCing the yearly dance with Natalie and Alasdair playing.

After returning to the Boston area for my postdoc fellowship in 1980, we and many others (among them Robert and Barbara McOwen, the Conants, Jeanne Morrill, Duncan Smith, Anne Tufts, Margaret Lepley, Jay Flynn, Ken Launie, Beth Murray, Pat McPherson, Ed Pearlman, and Anthony Moretti) joined together and formed the New Caledonians where

we danced many times a week for several years. It was a time when many of us lived in the Arlington area and gathered frequently to practice and socialize. We even practiced on the third floor of our rental. Many of us started highland with Lezlie Patterson in a small dance studio in Arlington. Around that time Jen was born and we just brought her along to practices or social events. I do remember one time at a social gathering at the McOwens that I went up to see how she was and she was under a pile of coats in her basket! After panicking at first it was funny that no one saw her

Trips were also made to Cardigan where we skied and danced. The request to write this brings back many memories as Jen was only months old and we traveled up on one of those icy snowy days and couldn't make it up the last hill. The excitement began when our car slid into Cary and Nick Browse's car and we rotated around each other. When we stopped and assessed that all were fine and praised the car seat, we started walking up. In the almost blizzard conditions, Nick carried Jen face down the whole way up the hill while Gregor, Cary and I carried other stuff. The next day in true New England fashion was a beautiful sunny day and we all skied. Those were also the days my parents who also danced came up for skiing. I have one photo from another trip of my dad skiing with Jen who might have been 3 or 4.

One day we were all roofing the Rawson's house as Ed Rawson was fighting cancer. We formed a scholarship trust (SDCEA) in honor of Ed Rawson. It quickly grew and honored others whose lives were cut short (Marianne Taylor, Isolde Lamont) and a yearly dance was held for many years. In fact, after we heard Natalie and Alasdair play in Wisconsin in 2018, Gregor invited Natalie and she and others played for a scholarship dance. I served on this committee for over 30 years and recently handed it over to others to continue its mission. Peter Tandy, our unsung hero, was another member for many years as were others. The scholarships are intended to make it a bit easier for people to attend events such as the ball, Pinewoods, NH Highlands and even facilitate attendance at teacher training or musician training.

As I think Gregor and I were one of the earlier ones to have children, we dropped out of the active dance community as children were not always desired. I'm glad times have changed. In the past 15 years we returned to dance at the Stow group, which was around the corner and helped Jeanetta teach. When Gregor became sicker with cancer, Jeanetta was right there ready to help me, another evidence of the continuing supportive community of Scottish dancing. I thank those of you personally who visited him in the hospital, in hospice and helped with his celebration of life. You know who you are.

I of course served on Exec for a number of years to help out the community of dancing. The occurrence of COVID hurt dancing but it also opened up the dance community and this time it was with Lois New who taught the Albany group. Lois reached out and we and others taught dancing via zoom with the benefit of Barbara Bemis and her son, Sam. It was a good time for the two of us, as Gregor had lost his battle with cancer and allowed us to be there for Lois when Cecil lost his battle with time. Over the last couple of years, a number across the country and world have participated and we continue to make new acquaintances and friends in the spirit of Scottish dancing.
