### A Letter from the President to the Membership

The "Times" they are a-changin": A New Era for the Tartan Times

The Tartan Times was born in 1956 (67 years ago) by Hugh Thurston. Evelyn Murray served as its dedicated editor from 1968 to 2017 (49 years!). The current editor, Barbara McOwen, assisted Evelyn for several years, and took over as editor when Evelyn returned to the UK. Barbara worked tirelessly to keep the Branch informed, with flyers, updates from Exec, news from classes, reminiscences, and obituaries (often from Evelyn), and news from our sister classes around the world.

Barbara's first love, as we all know, is playing and teaching the music of the Scottish fiddle. Last winter she indicated she was ready to hand-off the TT. Exec put out the word, and to our delight, Cathy Fahey, who currently edits the newsletter of the Massachusetts State College Association, the union to which she belongs, agreed to take the job. This will be Barbara's last issue. Cathy will edit the next one, to be published in early September.

We are all grateful to Barbara for her years of dedicated service and to Cathy for offering her experience and expertise. The Branch absolutely depends on people like them who share their talents and keep our traditions going!

Traditions also evolve. When the TT began, it was our only means of communicating with the members as a group. Now we have email, the Branch website, Facebook, and other media undreamed of in 1956. As Cathy presented her qualifications and ideas to Exec, we were impressed with her vision for the newsletter, namely that it should inform and inspire the membership and celebrate their accomplishments. She will identify, solicit, and edit stories for the TT that will fulfill her three-fold vision. The publication will be "net-native" (designed for the screen with the option of embedded links), but printed copies will still be mailed to those who want them.

We also agreed that differentiation of information flows was in order. Time-sensitive material (event flyers; party programs; class locations, meeting times, Covid protocols) and basic information (Branch officers, event coordinators) will in future appear on the appropriate pages of our website. This will allow rapid updates and avoid duplication between the website and the TT. The TT will also appear quarterly (four rather than six times a year).

I am sure Cathy will have more to say in her first issue, and Exec will follow up with event organizers and class leaders to clarify new information flows.

Please join us in saying Thank you! to Barbara and Cathy next time you see them. We are proud of its long history and look forward to the next chapter in the life of the Tartan Times!

### Cambridge Class

In late March, Cambridge Class Committee conducted a survey of dancers' preferences for mandatory masking and mandatory COVID vaccination requirements. We received 87 completed surveys with many thoughtful comments! Overall, 36% of respondents were in favour of mandatory masking while 69% were in favour of a mandatory COVID vaccination requirement. These are difficult issues and the Cambridge Class Committee knows and respects that many people have strong feelings from different perspectives. Based on the responses received and the current low COVID risk level in Middlesex county, the Cambridge Class COVID policy has been updated. Effective May 1st, masks will be mandatory on the first Monday of the month and optional on all other Mondays. We will continue to require dancers to be fully vaccinated for COVID. (Full details of the revised policy are available on the class webpage).

In May, the teachers will be Lance Ramshaw, Charles Liu and Susie Petrov, with band leader Sue Chari. In June, the teachers will be Jen Schoonover and Karen Sollins, with band leader Susie Petrov



### Flowers of the Forest - Murray Nicolson

from his obituary

Dr. Alexander Murray Nicolson, 84, of Concord, MA passed away on Saturday, April 1, 2023. Murray was born in Edinburgh in 1938, and graduated from Edinburgh University earning his BSc and PhD in Electrical Engineering. Soon after, he and his wife Barbara emigrated to the USA.

Murray had many interests including sailing, music, amateur radio, genealogy and, most importantly, his Scottish heritage. His enjoyment of music and dancing led him to become a certified instructor for the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society. Murray and Barbara enjoyed weekly dancing with the Concord and Weston groups, and their after-parties lasted well into the wee hours.

In the 1980s Murray became aware of land up for sale near the town of Portree that was destined to be developed with

housing. The land was near the ancestral home of the Clan MacNicol chief, Scorrybreac. Murray was able to have the land purchased and put into trust, thus creating the Urras Clann MhicNeacail. Since the creation of the trust, the lands have been popular with locals and tourists alike for walking and sight-seeing. Murray also earned the ranks of Sennachie, Chieftain, and High Commissioner for the Americas allowing him to wear two eagle feathers in his cap.

### The Music Really Will Tell You!

Music Workshop in Brunswick with Charles Liu, Terry Traub, and Malka Traub Pomerantz by Linda McJannet

Old-style jigs, two-step jigs; 16-bar vs. 32-bar reels; old-style strathspeys vs. lyrical slow airs and marches. Historically, the tunes we dance to come in a variety of forms. Scottish dancers' playful mantra that "the music will tell you what to do," is not far from the truth. A tune's rhythmic character, ornamentations, and tempo really do influence – even determine – what you can or are inspired to do as a dancer. This truth was amply demonstrated in a Music



Workshop arranged by The Teaching and Music Committee (TMC), led by Charles Liu, and hosted by the Brunswick class on March 18, 2023, at the Topsham Grange, Topsham, Maine.

Charles drew on James Stewart-Robertson's *The Athole Collection of the Dance Music of Scotland* (Edinburgh, 1884, reprinted 1961) and its meticulous analysis by Barbara McOwen, to enable us to dance the same dance to different tunes or to different versions of the same tune and to see how the variations affected us. By sharing

some sheet music in his handout, Charles enabled even the non-musician dancer to compare, for example, the dense ornamentation of the 1757 version of the main tune for *The Duke of Perth* with the sparser notation of the RSCDS version published in 1985. In the former, every bar is crowded with jolly clusters of sixteenth notes leading up to almost as lively clusters of eighth notes; the latter, eighth notes lead up to quarter notes emphasizing the 4/4 rhythm of the reel. Or

for another example, we learned that it is difficult (if not impossible!) to dance a strong, old-style strathspey, such as *John McAlpine* or the *Braes of Breadalbane*, to a lyrical slow march, such as *The Duchess Tree*. We need the force of the dotted-eighth and sixteenth notes (and the reverse, known as the Scotch snap) to drive us through the strong two-bar turns and casts.

When the exploratory comparisons were concluded, Terry and Malka played for a set of six dances, in which we all appreciated anew the



importance of music and musicality to our love of Scottish country dancing. Many thanks to the TMC, Charles, the Brunswick and other Maine classes, and the musicians for an informative and fun workshop!


### Featured in the Bookstore






Week 1 – Musicians' Ensemble course – July 16-23

### A Brief History of the Tartan Times

The Tartan Times was started some time in the fifties by the Boston Branch. Hugh Thurston was one of the early editors. before he took off for the West Coast and started another Newsletter, called *The Thistle [see: socalfolkdance.org/master*]  $teachers/thurston \ h.htm-ed.$ ]. The editor immediately before me was Alastair Duncan, and I took over in the fall of 1967. At the time the printing procedure was messy and complicated. The materials were typed onto waxed sheets, where making and then correcting a mistake was frustrating to say the least. Then these were placed in turn onto a drum, which was inked and the handle turned for as many copies as were required. The last part was collating, stapling, and then pasting slips with names and addresses, and finally the postage stamp. For the final jobs, Jeanetta McColl and Helen Platt would come from work. We would have dinner, then set up the table and get to work. To save money (and what Scot doesn't do that) some Tartan Times

were distributed at class, the remainder were mailed. Once the print shop system developed in Cambridge the system got much easier. Since then, the development of the internet has meant other short cuts so that now the whole magazine can be emailed to members directly. Over the years there were several people who took on the job of distribution, but the final and longest-serving was a couple in the Salem class, Marcie Rowland and Cal Perham. Cal would pick up the finished issue from the printer, and he and Marcie would complete the mailing using labels supplied by Peter Tandy. They did it as their contribution to the Branch, as they were unable to participate otherwise due to their work obligations.

Early on as Editor I had much help from Maurice Whitby who edited the Montreal Branch SCD Newsletter. One rule he had was that copy from another branch could be shared provided that acknowledgement was made. I learnt a lot from him.

I made two rules, one was that for all letters to the editor and personal articles the writer's name would be published. Nothing of this type could be anonymous. This came from an incident before my time when an anonymous letter accused an innocent party of misinformation, causing a great upset within the branch. The second was to never take advertisements. The reason for this is due to the IRS taxing all ad income to magazines including non-profit ones. It makes the treasurer's life easier. One can get around this last item within the branch to some extent by giving the information that so and so had produced a tape/CD/whatever without giving actual details, such as price. But often people do not understand the reasoning behind this.

An effort I made to help publicise the Boston Branch's events such as Pinewoods, the Ball, etc., was, I contacted all the RSCDS Branches in Canada and the USA plus some affiliated groups near the east coast, about exchanging newsletters. That expanded the numbers printed and mailed. I felt that the extra cost was worth it. Publicity is so important to any organisation such

as ours. One of the benefits of being the editor is making friends not only in one's own area but all over North America plus further afield. For years I corresponded with Heinz Duewell in Australia, until he passed away. It certainly underscores the international aspect of the RSCDS. Contact with Montreal continues to this day, with Jodie Hebert the current editor.

It's always a race to get materials from contributors and event chairs, and then to turn around and get the issue out in a timely manner. Editing is a team function and many people helped over the years. I thank them all, and for the many friendships that arose from the job. A special thank you to Barbara McOwen who took over as I left New England for Old England - she was just marvellous. I hope the Branch will thank her too, as she squeezed this time-consuming job into her already full calendar of responsibilities.

My best wishes to incoming Editor Cathy Fahey and her team. May their problems be small and easily solved.

My life here in England, in my house, south of London - due to Covid and all the lockdowns, etc., I become a 'sheltered' person. As I cannot drive, also due to Covid, I am dependent upon others to drive me to appointments or to shop, amongst other errands. My groceries are shopped for me and delivered to the house, so am very spoilt. Unfortunately my spine is now paying me back for past mis-use, and have trouble with my breathing, so dancing is clearly out of the window. Sadly both cats have died, Shah had a massive heart attack, and Solomon stomach cancer. On the plus side, my garden this spring is lovely, despite the drought last summer. I read, write emails, do crosswords, watch TV and relax! A very different life from Cambridge, Massachusetts.  $\sim$

In contrast, our new Editor, **Cathy Fahey**, this time duly appointed by Exec, is planning to re-imagine, re-design and re-build the Tartan Times from the ground up. It will be issued 4x a year, instead of the previous 6x, and the next issue will be September 1st or thereabouts. The usual

announcements and events can be placed and updated on the website, thanks to Meyer and Laura Billmers.

My thanks go to Evelyn for her many years of surviving all those deadlines; and latterly reversing roles with me and proofing. Gillian Charters was essential in helping me establish a Tartan Times publishing style, and she and Robert McOwen have also helped proof. Many thanks to John Crabtree for his contributions in printing and mailing the paper copies. By the way, it's well worth subscribing to the paper edition as well as the emailed edition - he makes it look so nice! And finally thanks to Linda McJannet for taking on the question of the balance between the Tartan Times, the website, Branch emails and our other means of communications (paging Beth Murray) in serving and unifying the Boston Branch.
